

TUITION/REGISTRATION FEES

Conference tuition is \$370 for NAACA members and \$595 for non-members. **Courts located in the 3rd, 4th & DC federal circuits (Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, North and South Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia) receive a 10% discount off regular tuition. If a court sends 5 or more attorneys, there will be a 20% discount off of tuition.** There is a separate fee of \$35 per person to attend the annual dinner (adults only please) and a fee of \$25 (\$30 for families) for guests attending social events other than the annual dinner. **Registration deadline is June 29, 2009.** Checks should be made payable to NAACA (Fed.
